Not only do the musicians, the singers, the various groups of actors and extras, as well as the technicians and stage hands, all have to learn their cues, the exits and their entrances; not only do the teachers who have unwittingly agreed to be in the thing have to learn their lines as well as the other backstage duties with which they have been lumbered at the last minute; not only do the lighting, video and sound effects all have to be cued down to the last second, but the whole thing then has to be imbued with that indefinable fairy dust that is the magic of theatre. Eyes are rolled, people tear their hair, lips are bitten and students start to moan when they find there will be yet another run through. But in the end it is the fairy dust that makes it all worthwhile and which makes everyone involved clamour to book their place in next year's production.

Flexible Friday

Flexible Friday is a new initiative we are delivering to KS4 this year. Flexible Friday is aimed at providing pupils with a love of learning across a range of activities, either in school or using the local community facilities, that can enhance their learning experiences and give them the opportunity to develop particular skills, interests and talents. In addition to the national curriculum we aim to develop the whole child as we believe that the teaching of life skills and enriching students is an essential part of preparing them for the future. Key stage 4 offers these enrichment sessions every Friday aftermoon from 1:35 – 3:20pm. Pupils sign up for a course that will run for a half term and then switch to another. The sessions are delivered by teachers, support staff and outside providers.

This half term students are getting involved in A History of Manchester, Melland Craft Company, Life Saving Skills and fun with fitness. Flexible Friday is underpinned with "The 5 R's for lifelong learning" also known as learning to learn, these are:

Readiness, Resourcefulness, Resilience, Responsibility, Reflectiveness





Anti-Bullying Awareness:

You may have seen some of the Anti-Bullying campaign on the TV or on buses and billboards. 4.O. group have used their English lessons to focus on what bullying is and how it can affect people. They watched some scenarios and role played some situations discussing feelings and thoughts and wrote all the words that came to mind when they discussed this issue.
